In the Beginning: Entering the Book of Genesis October 4, 2008 - May 2, 2009

The book of Genesis is one of the most excited, if often misunderstood, books of the Bible.

Our series will focus on the section often known as the "primeval history": Genesis' opening chapters of creation. We'll look up close at these familiar, rich, powerful stories of God's intentions for the earth and all that is in it, and how people responded "before history." We'll engage the love of language revealed in these beautiful, detailed stories in which every word counts in revealing God's presence and will for God's creatures. We'll also listen expressly as followers of Jesus who know how the larger story ends: with the life, death and resurrection of Jesus, the true "human being" who reveals God to us in flesh and blood.

Come join us for an exciting journey into the Bible's first book!

October 4: Rediscovering How to Read Genesis

The Bible's opening book was not written to answer scientific questions or to convey "facts" about history, but to offer a subversive, counter-story to the Babylonian creation story, Enuma Elish. We'll start by examining our assumptions about Genesis and the book's original cultural context.

November 1: "And God said" (Genesis 1)

We'll look at the grand, poetic presentation of God's glorious creating of heaven and earth, and how it challenges "imperial creation stories," then and now.

December 6: "YHWH God formed the 'adam from the dust of the 'adamah" (Genesis 2)

The "Garden of Eden," so often misread as a children's story, offers a beautiful, poignant vision of God's initial design for the relationships among God, humans and the earth.

January 10: "Knowing Good and Evil" (Genesis 3-4)

Where *did* the talking snake come from, anyway? We'll explore what went wrong and led to humanity's expulsion from the Garden and into the harsh world of daily sweat and toil. Once out of the Garden, things seem to fall apart rapidly. With Cain and Abel, we see the Bible's portrayal of how the first murderer is also the first city builder, seeking a sanctuary apart from God's presence

February 2: "The Earth Was Corrupt in God's Sight": the Flood (Genesis 5-9)

God comes, shockingly, to "regret" having made human beings because they have filled the earth with violence and corruption. But all is not lost: one man finds favor in YHWH's sight and enables humanity to survive and begin again.

March 7:" Let Us Build Ourselves a City ...and Make a Name for Ourselves" (Conscis 10, 11)

Ourselves" (Genesis 10-11)

The Story of the Tower of Babel is at once a hilarious political satire on the pretensions of ancient Babylon and a sober warning for all time about the limits and follies of human building projects undertaken apart from God.

April 4: "Go!" And Abram went (Gen 12-22)

The transition into "history" begins with YHWH's mysterious call of a single Babylonian, Abram, to leave all that is familiar for the promise of abundant "blessing." We'll look closely at both the begining and end of YHWH's relationship with Abra(ha)m and Sarai(h), as they struggle to obey this new Voice.

May 2: Giving Birth to Israel (Gen 25-50)

We will conclude with an overview of the trajectory of the remaining half of Genesis, as it continues across three generations, leaving YHWH's people in Egypt.

The goal of this series is to experience the book of Genesis from a perspective which calls on both faith and intelligence. To do so, we will balance presentation, large group and small group discussion, and shared prayer to open our hearts and minds to the challenge and hope that awaits us in the book of Genesis.

Each session combines prayer, singing, presentatation, individual silent reflection and small group sharing. It's amazing how quickly the time flies!
